The Normal Department is divided into three sections. The sessions are from 9 to 12 and 2 to 4 o'clock. The material of the school is very promising, and there will be no lack of competent, well-trained teachers for the schools of Northern Minnesota, and indeed for other parts of the State as well.

The rooms are crowded to their utmost capacity, and even at this early day the lack of a more capacious building is felt. The success of the school from its first beginning is extremely gratifying.
